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

Grown in Durham: Beef Farmers of Durham Donate to Foodbanks Across the Region




Envision Durham Proposed Policy Directions

Farm operators in Durham Region and across Canada are encouraged to complete the 2021 Census of Agriculture.






enhancing the countryside with art that has meaning to each farm and the farming community, while honouring our community's rich agricultural history.

AgriStability, one of the federal business risk anagement programs, has extended their


enrollment deadline to June 30, 2021. AgriStability offers support to farmers who have experienced income/margin reductions of more than 30 per cent.

Enhanced Agri-Food Workplace Protection Program

The provincial government has announced a commitment of \$10 million in funding towards the Enhanced Agri-Food Workplace Protection Program. Agri-businesses and farms who employ three or more employees are eligible for funding to support the purchase of personal protective equipment, improve cleaning and disinfection, and redesign workstations for worker safety. Application forms and additional program



information opens on April 22, 2021. Applications will be accepted until November 30, 2021 or until all funding has been allocated.

Federal Funding Announced for Canada's Egg, Chicken and Turkey Farmers

Two new funding programs have been announced to help support egg, chicken and turkey farmers.

The first program, the Poultry and Egg On-Farm Investment Program, aims to support farmers through on farm investment projects to help improve modernization of facilities through upgrades to increase the market competitiveness and adapt to consumer demands. \$630 million over the next ten years has been allocated towards the program.


The second program announced is the Market Development Program for Turkey and Chicken. This following funding is available to Turkey Farmers of Canada (\$36.5 million) and Chicken Farmers of Canada (\$25 million) to promote Canadian-made products and the high standards to which they are produced over the next ten years.

Ontario Tourism and Hospitality Small Business Support Grant (Coming Soon)

The Government of Ontario is introducing a new small business support grant targeted at helping Ontario's tourism and hospitality industry. This program will provide one-time payments of \$10,000 to \$20,000 to eligible hotels, motels, travel agencies, amusement and water parks, recreational and vacation camps, among other tourism and hospitality businesses. Any small businesses that



received funding from the Ontario Small Business Support Grant will not be eligible for this program. More application details will be available soon.

Ontario Announces the Agri-Tech Innovate Program

The Provincial Government recently announced the Agri-Tech Innovate Program, a cost-share program aimed to help farmers and food processors increase the adoption of technological innovations in the agri-food sector. This intake will support implementation of sectorspecific and innovative technologies in the workplace that enhance protection of workers against COVID-19, lead to increased business efficiencies and productivity, and help build the sector's resilience. The first intake will be available from May 17 to June 21, 2021.


Facebook Live Tours with Durham Region Farmers



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

Monthly Update

- Elexicon Energy continues to operate in its current Pandemic Mode of Operations, with management continually assessing corporate protocols and making updates as required. We are communicating with partners, suppliers and selective clients to determine if there will be any impacts to our current work in progress, and we are adjusting as necessary and will continue to notify and support them when required.
- On April 22nd, the Ontario Energy Board (OEB) <u>announced</u> new, lower electricity prices for households and small businesses, effective May 1st, 2021, under the Regulated Price Plan (RPP).

The new RPP Time-of-Use (TOU) prices set by the OEB for May 1st are shown in the table below. The table also shows the hours during which those prices apply:

Summer TOU Price Periods May 1 st TOU Prices	
Off-Peak	8.2 ¢/kWh
(Weekdays 7 p.m. – 7 a.m., all day weekends and holidays)	
Mid-Peak 11.3 ¢/kWh	
(Weekdays 7 a.m. – 11 a.m. and 5 p.m. – 7 p.m.)	
On-Peak 17.0 ¢/kWh	
(Weekdays 11 a.m. – 5 p.m.)	

The table shows the new RPP Tier prices and summer Tier threshold that apply to residential customers paying Tiered prices:

- Residential and small business customers can <u>choose their price plan</u>, either TOU or Tiered pricing. Customers are not required to select a price plan but if they wish to switch, they must notify us by completing and submitting an election form.
 - To date, 4,239 Elexicon Energy customers have changed their pricing structure or are in the process of doing so.
 - The OEB has a <u>bill calculator</u> to help customers who are considering a switch in pricing plans.



- On April 13th, the OEB <u>issued a notice</u> prohibiting all electricity distributors from issuing disconnection notices to residential customers for the duration of the province-wide stay-at-home measures. With the stay-at-home order now extended until May 19th, distributors cannot issue disconnection notices until May 20th, which effectively means they cannot disconnect residential customers for non-payment before June 4th.
- There are a number of financial assistance programs in place to support electricity consumers at this time, including:
 - The COVID-19 Energy Assistance Program This program provides an on-bill credit to residential, small business and registered charity customers who have overdue amounts on their electricity or gas bills as a result of the COVID-19 emergency. Credits are a maximum of \$750 for residential customers and a maximum of \$1,500 for small businesses and charities.
 - The Ontario Electricity Support Program This program provides low-income customers with a monthly <u>on-bill credit</u> to reduce their electricity bills. This program provides ongoing monthly help, ranging from \$35-\$75 depending on household income and size.
 - The Low-income Energy Assistance Program This program provides low-income customers who are in arrears and facing disconnection with a <u>one-time grant</u> towards their electricity or gas bill. It is for emergency situations. Eligible customers can receive up to \$500 for their electricity bill (up to \$600 for homes that are electrically heated), and up to \$500 for their natural gas bill.
- On April 1st, Elexicon Energy celebrated its second anniversary. It has been a year like no other, but one filled with learning new ways to work and collaborate, along with many milestones and achievements that we are very proud of.
- Scammers continue to target hydro customers during the pandemic, posing as utility representatives, threatening disconnection and offering rebates. Elexicon Energy is issuing regular reminders to look out for scams and steps to take if they suspect they are being contacted by a scammer.

- Elexicon Energy offices remain closed to the public
- 24/7 System Control Centre and crews available to respond to outages
- Regular Executive Leadership Team meetings



- Extended bill payment options and financial assistance programs are available to customers
- Model and stress testing our ability to operate in this fashion for an extended period of time considering what work can be done safely and without disruption to customers after the curve flattens
- Engaging with the province and industry bodies on additional measures being considered to support customers

Re: Time for Change Municipal Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act

Please be advised the Council of the Municipality of Chatham-Kent at its regular meeting held on March1, 2021 passed the following resolution:

WHEREAS the Municipal Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act R.S.O. 1990 (MFIPPA) dates back 30 years;

AND WHEREAS municipalities, including the Municipality of Chatham-Kent, practice and continue to promote open and transparent government operations, actively disseminate information and routinely disclose public documents upon request outside of the MFIPPA process;

AND WHEREAS government operations, public expectations, technologies, and legislation surrounding accountability and transparency have dramatically changed and MFIPPA has not advanced in line with these changes;

AND WHEREAS the creation, storage and utilization of records has changed significantly, and the Municipal Clerk of the Municipality is responsible for records and information management programs as prescribed by the Municipal Act, 2001;

AND WHEREAS regulation 823 under MFIPPA continues to reference antiquated technology and does not adequately provide for cost recovery, and these financial shortfalls are borne by the municipal taxpayer;

AND WHEREAS the threshold to establish frivolous and/or vexatious requests is unreasonably high and allows for harassment of staff and members of municipal councils, and unreasonably affects the operations of the municipality; AND WHEREAS the Act fails to recognize how multiple requests from an individual, shortage of staff resources or the expense of producing a record due to its size, number or physical location does not allow for time extensions to deliver requests and unreasonably affects the operations of the municipality;

AND WHEREAS the name of the requestor is not permitted to be disclosed to anyone other than the person processing the access request, and this anonymity is used by requesters to abuse the MFIPPA process and does not align with the spirit of openness and transparency embraced by municipalities;

AND WHEREAS legal professionals use MFIPPA to gain access to information launch litigation against institutions, where other remedies exist;

AND WHEREAS there are limited resources to assist administrators or requestors to navigate the legislative process;

AND WHEREAS reform is needed to address societal and technological changes in addition to global privacy concerns and consistency across provincial legislation;

BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Ministry of Government and Consumer Services be requested to review the MFIPPA, and consider recommendations as follows:

- 1. That MFIPPA assign the Municipal Clerk, or designate to be the Head under the Act;
- 2. That MFIPPA be updated to address current and emerging technologies;
- 3. That MFIPPA regulate the need for consistent routine disclosure practices across institutions;
- 4. That the threshold for frivolous and/or vexatious actions be reviewed, and take into consideration the community and available resources in which it is applied;
- 5. That the threshold for frivolous and/or vexatious also consider the anonymity of requesters, their abusive nature and language in requests to ensure protection from harassment as provided for in Occupational Health and Safety Act;
- 6. That the application and scalability of fees be designed to ensure taxpayers are protected from persons abusing the access to information process;
- 7. That administrative practices implied or required under the Act, including those of the IPC, be reviewed and modernized;
- 8. That the integrity of the Act be maintained to protect personal privacy and transparent governments.

Chief of Police Selection Process – Consultation Phase

The Durham Regional Police Services Board is pleased to announce that the consultation process for the selection of the next Chief of Police will soon begin. A Request for Proposals has been issued to solicit interest in supporting the Board in this process. The RFP is posted at

"Choosing the Chief of Police is one of the Board's most important responsibilities, and we approach this responsibility with an abundance of care and a commitment to a rigorous assessment process," said Board Chair, Bobbie Drew. "In order to choose the best candidate possible, the Board is initiating a comprehensive process that begins, as its foundation, with an understanding of the needs and perspectives of the community. We want to receive input from citizens across the Region, from DRPS members, and from all stakeholders on the qualities and characteristics of our next leader." The consultation process is identified as one of the key actions to increase transparency in decision making in the Board's Action Plan to Enhance Trust and Confidence in the DRPS.

The successful proponent that will assist the Board in the consultation phase will be identified in June, and public and stakeholder meetings will occur and an online survey will be made available to obtain input as soon as possible thereafter. Chief Rollauer, who has served as Chief of Police on an interim basis since September 2020, will continue in this capacity until the next Chief of Police is chosen. The Board wishes to express its gratitude to Chief Rollauer for his effective and steady leadership during this transition period.

The Durham Regional Police Services Board is the civilian governing body of the Police Service. Its responsibilities include establishing objectives for policing in consultation with the Chief of the Police, setting policies for the effective management of the Police Service, and hiring and monitoring the performance of the Chief of Police. The Board consists of seven members, three appointed by the Province of Ontario and four chosen by Regional Council.
