# Good afternoon,

The state of emergency has been extended to the end of day on Tuesday, February 9.

Originally made under the Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act, the declaration of emergency was set to expire at the end of day tomorrow, January 26.

The attached regulation, O. Reg. 24/21, is made by order of the Lieutenant Governor in Council under subsection 7.0.7 (2) of the Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act. Under that Act, the Lieutenant Governor in Council may extend the state of emergency by **one** period of 14 days.

As the Legislative Assembly is not scheduled to sit until February 16, I expect the Legislative Assembly will be recalled earlier than previously scheduled. The Legislative Assembly may vote to extend the state of emergency by additional periods of no more than 28 days: EMCPA, s. 7.0.7 (3).

The province's press release here notes that all orders un the EMCPA, including O. Reg. 11/21 (Stay-at-Home Order), O. Reg. 8/21 (Enforcement of COVID-19 Measures) and O. Reg. 13/21 (Residential Evictions) were also extended.

RE: Insurance Rates Resolution



Please be advised that the Council of the Municipality of Grey Highlands, at its meeting held January 20, 2021, passed the following resolution:

Whereas the cost of municipal insurance in the Province of Ontario has continued to increase – with especially large increases going into 2021; and

Whereas Joint and Several Liability continues to ask property taxpayers to carry the lion's share of a damage award when a municipality is found at minimum fault; and

Whereas these increases are unsustainable and unfair and eat at critical municipal services; and

Whereas the Association of Municipalities of Ontario outlined seven recommendations to address insurance issues including:

- 1. The provincial government adopt a model of full proportionate liability to replace joint and several liability.
- 2. Implement enhancements to the existing limitations period including the continued applicability of the existing 10-day rule on slip and fall cases given recent judicial interpretations and whether a 1 year limitation period may be beneficial.
- 3. Implement a cap for economic loss awards.
- 4. Increase the catastrophic impairment default benefit limit to \$2 million and increase the third-party liability coverage to \$2 million in government regulated automobile insurance plans.
- 5. Assess and implement additional measures which would support lower premiums or alternatives to the provision of insurance services by other entities such as nonprofit insurance reciprocals.
- 6. Compel the insurance industry to supply all necessary financial evidence including premiums, claims and deductible limit changes which support its own and municipal arguments

as to the fiscal impact of joint and several liability.
7. Establish a provincial and municipal working group to consider the above and put forward recommendations to the Attorney General;

Now therefore be it resolved that the Council for the Municipality of Grey Highlands call on the Province of Ontario to immediately review these recommendations and to investigate the unethical practice of preferred vendors who are paid substantial amounts over industry standards, despite COVID 19 delays, as insurance premiums will soon be out of reach for many communities and

Be it further resolved that this motion be provided to the Honourable Doug Ford, Premier of Ontario, the Honourable Peter Bethlenfalvy, Minister of Finance, the Honourable Doug Downey, Attorney General of Ontario, the Honourable Bill Walker, MPP for Bruce - Grey - Owen Sound, and all Ontario municipalities. CARRIED.

## **Update on the Keystone XL project**

The world watched last week as a new administration was sworn in in Washington, DC. The new US government immediately issued a number of Executive Orders, including one to rescind the permit for the Keystone XL pipeline expansion project. The Canadian federal government responded to this news stating that they will continue to make the case for the project to the US administration.

While FCM does not take a position on individual energy infrastructure projects, FCM's current policy calls on the Canadian government to support the development of nation-building energy infrastructure projects. FCM has reached out quickly to a number of key federal Ministers's offices to clearly reiterate FCM's Board policy on energy infrastructure. We heard a renewed commitment from our federal counterparts to continue to work with FCM and WEST to advance necessary energy infrastructure projects, like pipelines, within a framework of achieving net-zero emissions by 2050.

Here you'll find our Board-adopted resolutions from 2019 and 2020, calling on the government to support energy-producing regions, stipulating that energy infrastructure must meet high environmental standards and respect appropriate jurisdiction, and calling on the federal government to establish national utility corridors as a national priority with a predictable impact assessment processes.

# AMO Policy Update – 2021 OCIP Funding, 2<sup>nd</sup> Intake of Municipal Modernization Program, and Provincial Emergency Extension

A few provincial announcements occurred at the ROMA conference, which occurred on January 25-26, and we have put them together for your convenience.

# Second Intake of the Municipal Modernization Program Announced at ROMA Conference

During the 2021 Annual ROMA Conference, the Honourable Minister Steve Clark has <u>announced</u> the opening of the second intake of the Municipal Modernization Program. At today's announcement, the Minister noted that government is investing \$40 million dollars to help small and rural municipalities to assist with service delivery reviews and modernization efforts.

The funding is application based and targets 405 municipalities across Ontario. The first intake of the program saw 184 modernization projects funded. These included service reviews, implementing previous recommendations from service reviews, IT upgrades, or process improvements that help municipalities become more efficient with taxpayers' dollars.

# 2021 Ontario Community Infrastructure Fund (OCIF) Announced

Premier Doug Ford <u>announced</u> the 2021 <u>OCIF</u> envelope at the ROMA Conference on Monday. In 2021, OCIF will be stable with the Province providing \$200M again this

year to 424 municipalities across Ontario. Stability in the funding envelope has been a major policy goal of AMO's during the pandemic.

OCIF supports municipal core infrastructure such as roads, bridges, water, wastewater, and stormwater systems. Individual formula allocations to municipal governments have been provided by the Ministry of Infrastructure.

The Premier also noted in his remarks that the Province has allocated almost \$1 billion to broadband expansion. Affordable broadband access remains a key objective of AMO and ROMA. "WHEREAS municipalities are facilitators of the provincial process under the *Drainage Act* providing land owners to enter into agreements to construct or improve drains, and for the democratic procedure for the construction, improvement and maintenance of drainage works; and

WHEREAS municipal drain infrastructure and railway track infrastructure intersect in many areas in Ontario; and

WHEREAS coordination with national railways is required for the construction or improvement of drains that benefit or intersect with national railways; and

WHEREAS the national railways have historically participated in the process for construction, improvement and maintenance of drainage works; and

WHEREAS currently municipalities are experiencing a lack of coordination with national railways on drainage projects; and

WHEREAS the lack of coordination is resulting in projects being significantly delayed or cancelled within a year; and

WHEREAS municipal drains remove excess water to support public and private infrastructure and agricultural operations;

THEREFORE be it resolved that the Province of Ontario work with the Federal Minister of Transportation to address concerns regarding municipal drainage matters and need for coordination with the national railways; and

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# Let's make 2021 a year of hope

Between the COVID-19 pandemic and the municipal financial crisis, 2020 was the hardest year many of us have ever seen—as elected officials, and as Canadians. And while the changing of the calendar doesn't change the realities we face, I firmly believe that—together—we can make 2021 a year of hope.

With so many communities under siege by COVID's second wave, FCM's top priority remains ensuring municipal leaders have the tools to protect residents and businesses. That needs to start with continued operating support so you can keep vital local services going strong.

In the months ahead, we'll see a critical federal budget—and possibly a federal election. Just as we did last spring, FCM will make it clear that supporting Canadians through this pandemic means partnering with the order of government closest to their daily lives.

We'll also continue laying groundwork for Canada's long-term recovery. Your frontline expertise will be vital to getting this country back on its feet, so we'll need to position municipalities of all sizes at the heart of tomorrow's nationwide recovery. FCM has already put forward some early recommendations on what that could look like.

Returning to the status quo isn't enough. We have an opportunity to learn from this pandemic and to build back a country that's stronger than ever. One that's more inclusive, so benefits are widely shared. One that's more sustainable and resilient. And one where every community can prosper and thrive.

But we can't say it enough: before we can build that better Canada, we need to shore up frontline municipal operations—for the duration of the pandemic. Our federal partners need to hear that from us.

## **Growing our national voice**

Our greatest asset is our strong and united voice. It's what secured emergency funding through the Safe Restart Agreement. It's what led to the Rapid Housing Initiative. It's what compelled the

federal government to expand the Universal Broadband Fund. And much more.

So as local leaders continue to see Canadians through this pandemic—and in order to emerge stronger on the other side—we need to continue growing our national voice. Ottawa is where this country's pandemic plan is being shaped, and Ottawa is where we need to ramp up our efforts.




