Trent-Severn Waterway Water Management Update Friday, March 12, 2021

Parks Canada's water management team actively monitors water levels and flows and weather forecasts across the Trent-Severn Waterway. These factors are used to determine dam operations on a daily basis for the Trent-Severn Waterway. For more information regarding watershed status, please visit the website of your local conservation authority. These are <u>Kawartha Conservation</u>, <u>Otonabee Region</u> <u>Conservation Authority</u>, <u>Ganaraska Conservation Authority</u>, <u>Lower Trent</u> <u>Conservation Authority</u>, <u>Lake Simcoe Region Conservation Authority</u> or, in all other areas of the Trent and Severn Watersheds, the <u>Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources</u> <u>and Forestry</u>.

Weather

The 7-day forecast is indicating temperatures close to zero degrees Celsius and low precipitation amount.

This week's weather event resulted in a small precipitation event of 5 mm combined with temperatures approaching above 10 degrees and above zero at night. The warm-up and cool-down period was estimated to be approximately 36 hours in length. The brief warm spell is followed by more seasonal temperatures.

Outlook

Rainfall and warm temperatures have, for the most part, primed the snow to be ready to run off and also resulted in the ongoing snowmelt in the southern watershed. Water levels and outflows are expected to remain elevated at all locations due to the precipitation and snowmelt. Trent Severn Water Management team will be active, and the changing conditions will be closely monitored. Any watershed condition updates will be released by your <u>Conservation Authority</u> or local Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources district.

Haliburton and Northern Areas

Most of the reservoir lakes remain at their respective winter set dam configuration. Water levels on the lakes, in general, are below average and are levelling off after the recent event. Flows on the Gull and Burnt Rivers remain below average for this time of year and will likely stabilize with the onset of cold weather this weekend. The current snowpack is measured to vary from above average in some areas to average for this time of the year and is slowly receding with warm temperatures and localized melt.

Kawartha Lakes and the Otonabee River

Water levels on the Kawartha Lakes are below average but are levelling off due to the recent rain and ongoing snowmelt. Water flows on the Otonabee River are below average for this time of year. Flows will likely rise as a result of the mild temperatures and precipitation.

Rice Lake and the Lower Trent

Rice Lake's water level is above the long-term average and is rising as a result of the snowmelt. Water flows on the Lower Trent River are below average and expected to rise as a result of the recent event.

Severn River

Lake Simcoe water levels are below average and are increasing due to the recent event. Flows on the Black River are about average and rising but excepted to peak with the onset of the cold temperature this weekend. Flows on the Severn River are below average and will continue to increase with additional flows generated by the mild temperature.

Re: Advocacy for Reform of Joint and Several Liability

Dear Hon. Doug Ford,

During our budget deliberations and the review of the pricing for insurance for the 2021 year, Council is requesting that reform of the Joint and Several Liability system be undertaken. For the Municipality of Tweed, a small municipality within the County of Hastings, with population of 6,044 and total households of 3,023, as at the last census in 2016, we are experiencing significant increasing costs of insurance.

Over the last 5 years, we have experienced increase in our insurance premiums due to Joint and Several Liability. Our last 5 years of insurance premiums have been:

2017	\$161,441.84
2018	\$164,497.28
2019	\$171,649.20
2020	\$213,466.36
2021	\$265,170.24

Over the last 5 years, the annual premium has increased by \$103,728.40. That is 64.25%. For the Municipality of Tweed, the 2021 increase of \$51,703.88 results in a tax levy increase of 1.25%. Therefore, when Council wishes to keep the levy no higher than a 2% increase, especially under the financial times that residents have experienced due to the COVID-19 pandemic, more than half of this increase is allocated to insurance premiums. For a population of only 6,044, the annual cost of insurance per household is \$87.72 in 2021, compared to only \$53.41 in 2017.

This phenomenon is not unique to the Municipality of Tweed, nor is this a new concern. In 2010, the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) submitted *The Case for Joint and Several Liability Reform in Ontario* on April 1, 2010 (copy can be found at <u>https://www.amo.on.ca/sites/default/files/assets/DOCUMENTS/Reports/2010/TheCasef</u> orJointandSeveralLiabilityReforminOntario20100401.pdf). Because many view municipalities as having "deep pockets", they are often funding are larger portion of awards from court than what the fault percentage is. However, these "deep pockets" are at the cost of every taxpayer within the Municipality.

The Municipality of Tweed is advocating for reform and reconsideration of the *Negligence Act, R.S.O. 1990, c N. 1* to provide for alternatives. Many alternatives were provided in the 2010 AMO report previously referenced, including, but not limited to, Joint and Severable Liability at a set percentage of fault or Joint and Severable Liability based on type of damage.

• The company's Engineering Net Zero (Canada) report offers a blueprint for Canada to make its target of zero emissions by 2050 a reality.

The 2050 target requires immediate, concerted action and investment to be achievable.

- Canada needs to triple its power production levels over the next 30 years; third party forecasts in report show demand growing from 500 TWh to 1,500 TWh.
- Investment in engineering solutions are needed in every area of low carbon energy production hydro, nuclear, renewables, carbon capture and storage and hydrogen.

- 5. Consult industry in the development of the net zero 2050 plan, to ensure concrete, measurable and coordinated efforts are put in place, and to maximize the ROI for Canadians, both from a financial and environmental impact perspective.

"To achieve this monumental task, Canadian policy makers and industry need to urgently resolve a number of technical, commercial and collaborative challenges associated with decarbonizing the economy," said Dale Clarke, President, Infrastructure Services, SNC-Lavalin. "Jobs and growth will be spurred from the massive investments needed in existing, emerging and disruptive technologies. Cooperation and collaboration between governments at all levels, with input from the private sector, indigenous community and other stakeholders, will be essential. WHEREAS the Ontario Fire College Campus has been in operation in Gravenhurst since 1958; and

WHEREAS the Ontario Fire College Campus is one of the primary sources of certified training for Ontario Firefighters; and

WHEREAS the Ontario Fire College Campus has built a reputation of integrity, credibility, and reliability in providing some of the best training to our Fire Services within the Province of Ontario; and

WHEREAS the Ontario Fire College Campus has been used to train and certify both Volunteer, Part-Time and Career firefighters throughout Ontario; and

WHEREAS the Regional Training Centers are not all created equal and similar in function to the Ontario Fire College Campus; and

WHEREAS the Ontario Fire College Campus gives Ontario Firefighters another option other than Regional Training Centers to obtain National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) certifications; and

WHEREAS the Ontario Fire College Campus is the most cost-effective method for municipalities to certify Firefighters to NFPA Standards in Ontario; and

WHEREAS the Ontario Government enacted and revoked 0. Reg. 379/18: Firefighter Certification in 2018; and

WHEREAS when the Ontario Government revoked 0. Reg. 379/18: Firefighter Certification, it was made known by the Office of the Solicitor General that the act would be amended and brought back in the future; and



"Both heritage and creativity lay the foundations for vibrant, innovative and prosperous knowledge societies." (UNESCO, Protecting Our Heritage and Fostering Creativity) We

often talk about the potential of heritage places and historical landscapes to inspire and stimulate creativity. That potential – that intersection of historical place with innovation and imagination – is reflected in the Trust's values and its work.

Let me tell you about the <u>Doris McCarthy Artist-in-Residence Program</u> at Toronto's Fool's Paradise, which the Trust operates at the former home and studio of Canadian artist Doris McCarthy. Since 2015, 40 artists have participated, helping us to realize Doris' vision to provide a unique, living and working incubator for visual artists, musicians and writers of all disciplines. And participants have drawn inspiration from the surrounding landscape of the Scarborough Bluffs. Visual artist Steven Beckly said of his 2017 experience: "It helped me re-establish an intimate connection with the environment, which has affirmed a new sense of purpose in my work."

Of course, the beautiful <u>Elgin and Winter Garden Theatre Centre</u> – with its stacked theatres, rehearsal studios and lobby spaces – is a creative hub in the arts community, providing unique places of assembly, hosting performances, festivals and film shoots. It has been a venue of choice for many theatre and event producers, film directors and audiences.

Film designers and directors have long found inspiration in Ontario's historical sites and landscapes. Prior to the pandemic, film tourism was growing significantly. Trust sites have provided the backdrop for many film and television productions, such as The Shape of Water, The Handmaid's Tale, The Umbrella Academy, Zeus, Mrs. America and Self Made: Inspired by the Life of Madam C.J. Walker.

Heritage spaces encourage introspection. They connect us in interesting ways to the spirit, capabilities and resilience of people of earlier times, and those values ripple through time and experience to influence our present. They inspire stories, art and performances, music and dance. The <u>Lieutenant Governor's Ontario Heritage Awards</u> have celebrated excellent examples of conservation initiatives that showcase the connection of space with cultural expression.

Below, we share some examples from the Trust's work and that of partners across the province. These points of connection among the heritage sector, creative industries and the culture economy are vital to vibrant societies and become increasingly important as we transform and renew, as we reconnect communities with heritage spaces and historical landscapes to create theatre, performance, music and dance, promote publishing, and imagine new technologies.

Recent research by Heritage Alliance in the U.K. has shown that "... creative businesses are naturally drawn to the atmosphere and the unique character of the historic environment – many cluster around groups of heritage buildings and conservation areas. In fact, 26% of creative industries are located in conservation areas."

Recognizing creative excellence

The annual Lieutenant Governor's Ontario Heritage Awards honour groups and individuals who have contributed to heritage conservation, environmental sustainability and biodiversity, and cultural and natural heritage. Some of these projects have also connected space with cultural expression and creativity – from film projects to live performances to adaptive reuse. Examples include:

- The Performance of The Ward Cabaret (2020 recipient): This cabaret was conceived to throw a spotlight on Toronto's The Ward, the city's first significant immigrant enclave, telling incredibly rich stories of the urban experience of life in Toronto. The Ward Cabaret restores the vibrant stories and street sounds of St. John's Ward, bringing new life to a now-vanished space and using music to forge a connection to the past.
- Home Made Visible (<u>2019 recipient</u>): Home Made Visible is an archival and digital stories preservation project, active between 2018-19. Through the digitization of home movie footage from Indigenous people and visible minorities, the project addresses a deficit in archived footage from these groups in Canadian archives. It has digitized 296 home movies in two years, with the guidance and archiving

expertise of York University Libraries.

• The Restoration of the Windsor Armouries (2018 recipient): The University of Windsor transformed the 1901 Windsor Armouries, once home to the Essex Fusliers, into a state-of-the-art learning centre for the creative arts. The restoration is playing a key role in the revitalization and diversification of Windsor's downtown, has given a new focus to Windsor's military history, and has provided significant additional learning space for the creative arts.



Support for Local Fire Services During COVID-19

Yesterday, the Ministry of the Solicitor General <u>announced</u> it will provide \$5 million to help municipal fire services address the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. This onetime funding will enhance fire safety training across the province and support safety inspection programs to ensure compliance with the Ontario Fire Code. Recognizing that Ontario's fire departments vary in size, capacity and levels of risk, each municipality will be able to submit proposals for an initial \$4,500 base grant plus additional funding dependent on population served.

Updated COVID-19 Vaccine Tools and Resources

The Ministry of Health vaccine tools and resources have been updated and are now posted to the <u>Ministry's website</u>. Changes are highlighted within these documents, and new documents include information for AstraZeneca and COVISHIELD COVID-19 vaccines.

The Municipality of Shuniah has passed the following resolution at the March 9, 2021 council meeting:

The Council of the Municipality of Shuniah hereby supports the resolution of the Corporation of the Municipality of West Grey wherein they call on the Province of Ontario to review the seven recommendations of AMO to investigate the following municipal insurance issues, as insurance premiums will soon be out of reach for many communities:

1. The provincial government adopt a model of full proportionate liability to replace joint and several liability.

2. Implement enhancements to the existing limitations period including the continued applicability of the existing 10-day rule on slip and fall cases given recent judicial interpretations and whether a one-year limitation period may be beneficial.

3. Implement a cap for economic loss awards.

4. Increase the catastrophic impairment default benefit limit to \$2 million and increase the third-party liability coverage to \$2 million in government regulated automobile insurance plans.

5. Assess and implement additional measures which would support lower premiums or alternatives to the provision of insurance services by other entities such as non-profit insurance reciprocals.

6. Compel the insurance industry to supply all necessary financial evidence, including but not limited to, premiums, claims and deductible limit changes which support its own and municipal arguments as to the fiscal impact of joint and several liability.



Durham Region 2019 Ontario Parasport Games receives national PRESTIGE Award

?

The Durham Region 2019 Ontario Parasport Games has been recognized by Sport Tourism Canada with a 2020 PRESTIGE Award for Canadian Sport Event of the Year (Group B: budget less than \$1 million). The Games was also a finalist for Sport Event Legacy of the Year.

After three years of preparation, the Ontario Parasport Games were successfully hosted in Durham Region from February 8 to 10, 2019. More than 500 participants, including over 300 athletes, traveled from across the province to compete in 11 sports at eight venues.

Following the Games, 94 per cent of participants reported they had an excellent or good overall Games experience and 92 per cent of volunteers said they enjoyed their volunteer experience.

Recipients were announced on March 4 during the online PRESTIGE Awards, hosted by

Olympian, World Cup medalist and CBC Broadcaster, Kelly VanderBeek, after being postponed last year due to pandemic restrictions.

The Games brought \$678,000 in economic impact for Durham Region and a \$111,900 Legacy Fund—nearly 500 per cent over the target for the fund. The legacy funding is currently being used to raise awareness about opportunities and participation in adaptive sport in Durham Region, including:

- A grant program to support youth from lower income families to participate in parasport, in partnership with Durham-based not-for-profit Their Opportunity.
- The Parasport School Grow It program delivered in partnership with Abilities Centre and the Durham Adaptive Sport Collective, to introduce four parasports, which includes providing instruction and equipment, to 25 to 30 schools in Durham Region.
- An adaptive sport festival hosted in Durham Region.
- Sledge Hockey accessibility upgrades for a rink at Iroquois Park Sports Centre in Whitby.
- Durham Adaptive Sport Collective initiatives to grow adaptive sport participation.

The organizing committee spearheaded by Sport Durham, along with more than 300 volunteers, delivered everything Durham needed for success. By sponsoring, volunteering, knitting toques and filling the stands, our community really answered our call to "Be the Roar" and help make our Games a memorable experience for everyone.

The Games celebrated inclusiveness and accessibility, and helped grow awareness and participation in adaptive sports. This award serves not only to honour the efforts of everyone involved, but also to further those goals. Thank you to everyone who helped in the Games' success—when we all play together, we all win together.




Recovery Task Force

On **March 10**, the Ontario government <u>announced</u> the new Tourism Economic Recovery Ministerial Task Force. AMO Policy Update – Long-Term Care Modernization and Expansion, Asset Management Plan Timelines Extended, and Age-Friendly Community Planning

Ontario Investing to Modernize and Expand Long-Term Care

The Ontario government <u>announced</u> today an investment of \$933 million in 80 new long-term care projects. This will result in additional new and upgraded long-term care spaces across the province.

The funding will add 7,510 new spaces and upgrade 4,197 spaces, including new spaces for Indigenous, Francophone, and other cultural community residents. It is all part of the government's commitment to add 30,000 long-term care spaces over ten years.

The criteria for selecting the projects being announced today included:

- upgrading older homes in response to lessons learned around improved Infection Prevention and Control (IPAC) measures, particularly the elimination of three and four-bedrooms;
- adding spaces to areas where there are high needs;
- addressing the growing needs of diverse groups, including Francophone and Indigenous communities; and/or,
- promoting campuses of care to better address the specialized care needs of residents.

As additional information becomes available, it will be shared with AMO members.

Asset Management Plan Timelines Extended

The Ministry of Infrastructure has filed regulations to extend asset management plan

(AMP) timelines for municipalities. The new regulations extend the deadlines by one year for the plan criteria deadlines. Planning timelines are now:

- July 1, 2022 plans are required for core municipal assets
- July 1, 2024 plans are required for all municipal assets
- July 1, 2025 plans are required to include service levels and their appropriateness; a lifecycle management and financial strategy; funding sources and needs; and other assumptions.

The timelines were extended to account for challenges to staff and planning work posed by the pandemic. AMO understands that the Ministry will be writing to municipal officials to formally advise them of these extensions.

Government Releases New Age-Friendly Community Planning Guide

The <u>Creating a More Inclusive Ontario: Age-Friendly Community Planning Guide for</u> <u>Municipalities and Community Organizations</u> is intended for those working to develop and support age-friendly communities in Ontario. Age-friendly communities help create more accessible environments for people of all ages and abilities across diverse communities in the province. These communities respond to the opportunities and challenges of an aging population and align with the <u>Advancing Accessibility in</u> <u>Ontario framework</u>.

Along with the Community Planning Guide, the Province has released three supporting documents to support the creation, implementation, and sustaining of local plans. These are the <u>diverse populations addendum</u>, <u>age-friendly community planning</u> toolkit, and <u>age-friendly community remote events planning resource</u>.
