

**COVID-19: Big push on financial support for municipalities** 

It's been another week of unprecedented challenges—and remarkable municipal leadership. You are working hard to keep vital services running and residents supported. FCM is pressing hard for the financial assistance many of you will need to continue your vital week.

Last week, FCM continued intensive conversations with senior federal decision-makers. And we kept grounded in local realities through continual member engagement. That included teleconferences with FCM's Rural Forum, our Big City Mayors' Caucus, our Provincial-Territorial Associations, and a group of local Chief Financial Officers.

Our municipal challenges are Canada's challenges. Our progress is Canada's progress. And our story is increasingly being told by the country's national press. That includes a **major feature in Monday's** *Globe and Mail* (following earlier coverage in Postmedia outlets across Canada).

#### Other highlights from Ottawa:

- On Saturday, Parliament adopted the \$73 billion COVID-19 wage subsidy package, which will subsidize up to 75 percent of salaries for qualifying employers.
- In Saturday's emergency sitting of the House, the federal government committed to adapt the Canada Emergency Response Benefit to include more more people in our communities.
- Yesterday, the federal government announced that farmers and food processors will receive \$1,500 per temporary foreign worker to assist in their 14-day quarantines.

As local leaders, you are absolutely central to carrying Canadians through this pandemic onto better roads ahead. And FCM will be here for you every step of the way.

## Support for Canada Summer Jobs will help communities

As Canada faces economic uncertainty during the pandemic, the federal government has updated the Canada Summer Jobs program to help support the ongoing needs of communities. The temporary changes include a wage subsidy to cover up to 100 percent of the minimum hourly wage for each employee and the ability to modify projects to support essential services. These developments will help keep youth active in the labour market and protect community services.

At Metrolinx, the health and safety of our staff and customers is of critical concern. In continued support of provincial action in protecting Ontarians from COVID-19, Metrolinx took the unprecedented step of reducing GO Transit and UP Express services.

**Starting April 8**, all GO train lines will continue to operate – with reduced frequency. GO bus service will also be adjusted. Revised GO schedules are available here:

- Train Routes: gotransit.com/trainschedulechanges
- Bus Routes: gotransit.com/busschedulechanges

Rail service will run every 60-90 minutes at times of day each line generally has service. Bus service will also be reduced and adjusted to align with train service. UP Express will continue to operate every 30 minutes.

All trains on our branch lines will be reduced to six coaches in order to make better use of our resources while ridership is low. Please adjust where you wait on the platform depending on your station.

Our key consideration is ensuring our services can continue and our employees and customers are safe. By reducing our service, we are able to rotate our employees on our vehicles and stations.

The reduced services are in line with significant reduction in ridership due to the direction of Public Health to self-isolate. We're seeing passenger reductions in the 90% range, and we continue to monitor the numbers closely.

Our customers will still get the same safe experience, our Transit Safety and customer service teams will continue to be available to help customers get where they need to go. Our teams will also maintain the increased level of cleaning on our vehicles and stations.

We are continuing to monitor service very closely and adjusting service to get essential workers to their shifts in hospitals, shelters, food service, nursing home, etc. so they can get to where we need them most – on the frontlines.

## AMO COVID-19 Update – New Emergency Orders

#### **Extension of All Ontario Emergency Orders until April 23**

Today, the Province has extended all emergency orders under s.7.0.2 (4) of the *Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act* (Ontario Takes Further Action to Stop the Spread of COVID-19) until April 23, 2020, including the closure of outdoor amenities in parks and recreational areas, non-essential workplaces, public places and bars and restaurants, along with restrictions on social gatherings. This extension is to help stop the spread of COVID-19 and protect the health and safety of Ontarians.

In addition, new measures have been introduced to address surge capacity in retirement homes, restrict recreational camping on Crown land, and allow the repurposing of existing buildings and temporary structures.

#### **Temporary Health Care Structures for COVID-19**

On April 9<sup>th</sup>, an emergency order (<u>Order under Subsection 7.0.2 (4) of the Act - Temporary Health or Residential Facilities</u>) under the *Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act*, provides relief from the Building Code to temporary health care structures being built for COVID-19 purposes. These structures are not designed to meet the normal requirements for health care facilities (such as HVAC or oxygen gas lines). However, they are needed as hospitals require new beds to care for those suffering from the pandemic as well as the other patients.

Specifically, the structures will:

- not be subject to the Building Code,
- no building permit will be required,
- no zoning or site plans will be required.

These structures would need to be designed by architects and approved by engineers. Both these professions would have to sign off on the structures. The Chief Building Official (CBO) will need to deem the building safe and regularly inspect for structural sufficiency in keeping with the original design. We understand that CBOs have requested this approach and have been consulted by the Province in advance of this order.

Discussion about the orderly dismantling of these structures during the recovery period is taking place and will unfold as the epidemic starts to subside.

The Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing will be setting up webinars soon to take building officials and municipal staff though the order and answer questions. More MMAH information about those sessions will be coming next week.

#### Construction Act Payment Suspension Revision

The Province has revised one *Construction Act* section of a previous emergency order, O. Reg. 73/20 made under the *Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act*, which suspended limitation periods and procedural time periods retroactive to March 16, 2020. At the time of this update, O. Reg. 73/20 has not been revised to include this revision on the provincial e-Laws site.

This emergency order has been amended to lift the suspension of limitation periods and procedural time periods under the *Construction Act*. This will allow for the release of holdback payments to contractors and subcontractors in the normal course, helping to resolve a potentially significant cash flow problem as a result of the order for the construction industry.

The suspension will be lifted on April 16, 2020, to give the industry time to prepare for these changes. Once lifted, parties will have the same amount of time to meet a deadline that had been remaining before the suspension began on March 16, 2020.


#### Child Care Operators prevented from Charging Fees while Closed

During the COVID-19 outbreak, the Ontario government is temporarily preventing child care centres from collecting payments from parents, while also ensuring that their child care spaces are protected. Child care centres, with the exception of those accommodating health care and other frontline workers, were ordered closed to help prevent the spread of the virus and keep the children and child care staff safe.

An emergency order (<u>Ontario Protects Parents during COVID-19</u>) has been issued, and immediately prevents any child care operator from charging parent fees where care is not being provided. The order also means that parents cannot lose their child care space because they are not paying fees during this period. This order will affect closed municipal child care centres.

I am writing to let you know that the Ontario government is revising one element of a previous emergency order, O. Reg. 73/20 made under the *Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act*, which suspended limitation periods and procedural time periods retroactive to March 16, 2020.

The previous order was made to help Ontarians who are having difficulty meeting those time requirements as a result of the COVID-19 outbreak.

The emergency order has been amended to lift the suspension of limitation periods and procedural time periods under the *Construction Act*. This will allow for the release of holdback payments to contractors and subcontractors in the normal course, helping to resolve a potentially significant cash flow problem as a result of the order for the construction industry.

The suspension will be lifted on April 16, 2020, to give the industry time to prepare for these changes. Once lifted, parties will have the same amount of time to meet a deadline that had been remaining before the suspension began on March 16, 2020.

The amendments to the order also address the *Niagara Escarpment Planning and Development Act*. The amendments to O. Reg. 73/20 will be posted on e-Laws at: <a href="https://www.ontario.ca/laws/regulation/200073">https://www.ontario.ca/laws/regulation/200073</a>.

Please note that at the time you receive this email, e-Laws may not yet be updated to reflect the amendments.

## Ontario Registrar General Permits Temporary Measures for Burial Permit Issuance

The Ontario Registrar General (ORG) has temporarily permitted the electronic transfer or faxing of death registration documents amid COVID-19 and allow municipalities to safely issue burial permits.

Below is a summary of the changes:

- Regulation 1094 of the *Vital Statistics Act* has been amended to allow a copy to be made of the medical certificate to be sent between coroners, funeral directors, and division registrars.
- A funeral home may send a copy of the statement of death and medical certificate of death and/or coroner's warrant to bury through a secure electronic method or fax. A municipality may also send an acknowledgment of death to a funeral home using the same methods.

- Original documents will need to be sent to the municipality weekly on a 'best effort basis' for processing.
- The electronic exchange of documents must be completed in accordance with the municipality's IT and encryption policies and follow requirements under MFIPPA.

Ontario's local governments will continue to provide death registration services 7 days a week.

Over the past two weeks, AMCTO has worked with our partners at the City of Toronto, the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO), and an informal group of Clerks across the province to seek these reforms.

## COVID-19 Update: New COVID-19 Related Items You Need to Know

#### Ontario Cannabis Stores can Temporarily Offer Curbside Pick-Up and Delivery

Given the long-term goal of establishing a legal cannabis market in Ontario and continued operation of illegal sales, the Government of Ontario has <u>authorized</u> cannabis stores to offer temporary curb-side pick-up and delivery of their products. The authorization is in place immediately and will continue, possibly with extension, until provincial closure orders are lifted.

Revisions to Ontario's essential services list on April 3<sup>rd</sup> removed cannabis retail stores as essential for the purposes of the emergency response to COVID-19. Cannabis stores and others not included in the revised list were ordered to close as of 11:59 p.m. on April 4<sup>th</sup>. Prior to closing many retailers observed long line ups and strong demand. Unlike other retailers, cannabis stores were prohibited from offering their products through phone or online access – meaning these retailers were left unable to operate at all.

Sales of cannabis through curbside pick-up and delivery can be offered from 9 a.m. – 11 p.m., Monday – Sunday, and products must be paid for prior to pick-up or delivery of the product. All conditions such as maximum amounts (30g) per purchase, minimum age, and prohibiting sales to intoxicated people remain in place. Transactions including home delivery can only be completed by the retail license holder or a direct employee certified under <u>CannSell</u> – third-party delivery is prohibited.

As is already the case with purchases through the Ontario Cannabis Store (OCS), AMO understands that stores offering delivery are able to do so in any municipality, including those that have opted out of allowing cannabis retail in their communities. During the Provincial Emergency Period the AGCO has announced it will pause new retail store authorizations; however, retail store operator and manager licenses will continue to be processed.

#### Further Suspension of Noise By-laws

In order to facilitate essential health care and residential construction, a regulation was passed (<u>Ontario Regulation 131/20</u>) which limits Section 451.1 of the *Municipal Act* by lifting *municipal noise by-laws to permit certain construction work to continue outside of the normal workday/work week. The decision to work during hours* 

that normally would be prohibited under a noise by-law is at the discretion of the construction company. This exception applies to:


- Construction projects and services in a municipality associated with the healthcare sector, including new facilities, expansions, renovations and conversion of spaces that could be repurposed for health care space, at any time of the day or night.
- Any other construction activity in a municipality may operate between the hours of 6 a.m. and 10 p.m.

No amendments to municipal by-laws are required.

The provincial help line at 1-888-444-3659 is a resource for clarification on what municipal construction projects could be considered to be on the revised services list. That said, it may be prudent for municipal governments to consult with legal counsel for clarity on individual projects. Any of the workplaces that remain open must abide by the directives from the Chief Medical Officer or local public health units and comply with the *Occupational Health and Safety Act*.

# Changes to Canada Summer Jobs program to help businesses and young Canadians affected by COVID-19











#### Risks in the next 3 months







# AMO COVID-19 Update: Bill 189, Coronavirus Support and Protection Act, 2020 Receives Royal Assent

Today, the Province extended the Declaration of Emergency under the *Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act* for a further 28 days, to May 12, 2020. This extension was made to help stop the spread of COVID-19 and protect the health and safety of Ontarians.

The extension of the provincial declaration of emergency allows Ontario to continue to enforce current emergency orders. A full list of emergency orders can be found on the <u>e-Laws website</u> under the <u>Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act</u>.

#### **Bill 189 Receives Royal Assent**

Municipalities Ontario

Today Bill 189 was introduced and passed by the Ontario Legislature. Of municipal significance, the Act amends the *Planning Act*, the *Development Charges Act*, and the *Police Services Act*. This new legislation was intended to demonstrate that the government is actively listening to the concerns of education and municipal stakeholders during this COVID-19 emergency.

At the time of writing this update, the legislation has not been posted but the Province has <u>released a backgrounder</u> with a summary of these changes. While AMO staff will provide further Bill 189 analysis if required, here are the municipal implications that we understand Bill 189 will have:

#### **Planning**

We understand that Bill 189 temporarily suspends specified timelines for applications for development and land use planning matters. This relief may be applied retroactively to the date that an emergency was declared. This legislation allows those municipalities who want to proceed with planning applications to do so while allowing those that are not in a position to proceed to redirect efforts to dealing with the COVID emergency without fearing appeals for missing deadlines. The timelines would return to normal once the emergency ends.

We appreciate the efforts of Minister Clark to bring about these extensions to development approvals timelines. AMO will continue to press for similar suspension to all statutory timelines that municipal governments are currently required to follow. As well, AMO is requesting that when timelines are restarted there should be a reasonable recovery period to properly manage any backlog.

#### **Development Charges**

The changes to the Act governing development charges ensures that municipal governments can continue to use their existing development charge bylaws. Preserving these existing bylaws allows municipalities to continue collecting development charges without having to replace expiring bylaws. AMO understands municipalities will have six months from the end of the declared emergency to develop new development charge bylaws.

In addition, education related development charges may still be collected.


#### **Police Services Act**

Municipalities had previously been mandated to complete Community Safety and Wellbeing Plans by January 1, 2021. This due date will no longer apply. The Solicitor General will establish a new deadline, by regulation, at a future date.


The above changes will allow municipal governments and their staff to continue to focus on responding to the public health emergency in the months ahead.



# AMO COVID-19 Update: Action Plan for Long-Term Care Homes Released and Planning Update

Today, the Province released a Long-Term Care Action Plan and subsequent regulations under the *Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act* (EMCPA), in an attempt to help stop the spread of COVID-19 and protect the health and safety of Ontarians residing in long-term care homes. In particular, the <u>announced changes</u> to long-term care homes under the new emergency orders are intended to reduce the unintentional spread of COVID-19 which officials believe may be caused by the movement of staff among different care environments.

#### Ontario's COVID-19 Action Plan for Long-Term Care

Today, the Province released the <u>COVID-19 Action Plan: Long-Term Care</u>. The Plan adds critical new measures to prevent further outbreaks and deaths from COVID-19 in long-term care homes, including:

- Aggressive testing, screening, and surveillance for staff and residents (both symptomatic and asymptomatic).
- Managing outbreaks and spread of the disease including providing public health and infection control expertise and additional training and support to current staff.
- Growing the long-term care workforce which includes redeploying staff from hospitals and home and community care.

Regarding redeployment, yesterday the Province passed <u>Ontario Regulation 146/20</u>, under <u>subsection 7.0.2 (4)</u> of the EMCPA. It means that as of midnight, Wednesday, April 22, an employee who performs work at a long-term care home cannot work at another health service provider or a retirement home. Workers must inform each of their employers that they subject to this order by 5pm on Friday, April 17<sup>th</sup>. Note that this order is notwithstanding any collective agreements the employee is under.

Long-term care providers must ensure that any employee of their home is not performing work elsewhere, and that the order be posted. Regulation 147/20 under subsection 7.0.2 (4) of the Act titled, Work Deployment Measures in Long-Term Care Homes, enables this redeployment to happen.

#### Update on Bill 189 - New Planning Act Timelines

Yesterday <u>Bill 189</u> added a new section to the *Planning Act*, Sec. 70.11, which allows for temporarily suspending specified timelines for development applications during COVID 19 while the *Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act* is in effect. This relief applies retroactively to the date that the emergency was declared and took effect as of the date of Royal Assent, yesterday.

O.Reg. 149/20 implements this new section of the *Planning Act*. This impacts all types of notices, appeals and interim control by laws. The details of the regulation are complex. An explanatory note from MMAH is expected to be posted on the <u>ERO</u> in the next few days.

This legislation allows those municipalities who want to proceed with planning applications to do so while allowing those that are not in a position to proceed to redirect efforts to dealing with the COVID emergency without fearing appeals for missing deadlines. The timelines would return to normal once the emergency ends.





Dear Heads of Council and Councillors:

Re: Issues regarding the mapping of Provincially Significant Wetlands (PSWs)

Norfolk County Council is working to address significant issues that have come to our attention regarding the mapping of Provincially Significant Wetlands (PSWs).

Following the Ministry's updated mapping related to PSWs, the County updated its Official Plan to bring its policies in line with the new mapping. Following that, the County planning staff introduced a Zoning By-Law amendment to update the zoning to reflect the new mapping and to provide consistency between the Zoning By-Law and the Official Plan. Though the mapping is wholly outside the County's process and control, the zoning by-law amendment was not approved by Council, flowing from significant public concern about the updated mapping affecting people's properties. In some cases, some of these changes were very significant.

The County submitted comments to the province as part of the review of the Provincial Policy statement requesting that the process for PSW mapping be significantly improved to allow for transparency and better land owner engagement, including, for example, a right of appeal or formal dispute resolution process. This will allow for land owners to be properly informed and engaged where land use designations that affect their property may result. The current process appears to be severely underfunded and without any meaningful way for affected residents to engage.

The County is seeking support from other rural municipalities who may be affected by this to address this issue with the province.

Dear Head of Council:

As you know, on March 17, 2020, our government declared a provincial emergency pursuant to the authority granted under the *Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act* (EMCPA). I am writing to update you that on April 16, 2020, our government issued an emergency order under the EMCPA (O. Reg. 157/20) to provide municipalities with the flexibility to deploy certain of their staff to where they are needed most. At this critical time, it is important that municipalities continue to work collaboratively and engage in good faith with their bargaining agents. The order is effective immediately and we intend for it to remain in effect for the duration of the declared provincial emergency.

I know that these are challenging times for municipalities, particularly as the situation around us changes so quickly. In these unprecedented times, I have heard a strong and consistent message from municipalities and numerous sector organizations that the authority to enable work deployment similar to what has been provided by the Province for hospitals and public health units is urgently needed to ensure continuity of critical services.

I thank you for sharing these concerns. We have heard you and have worked quickly to issue this order. This order is a temporary measure and provides your municipality – as an employer – the authority to take any reasonable measure necessary to respond to COVID-19 with respect to internal work deployment.

In order to exercise this authority, if it hasn't already, the municipality will need to also declare an emergency under section 4 of the EMCPA concurrent with this order. The authority provided for in this order includes the ability for municipalities to redeploy certain of their staff within the same employer or to employ volunteers to perform bargaining unit work, cancel leaves and change assignment of work, for those priority services listed in the order.

The orders specify conditions under which the authority can be exercised. This includes requiring a municipality to provide at least 24 hours of advance notice to affected bargaining units before implementing a redeployment plan. The *Occupational Health* and *Safety Act* and existing rights under the *Employment Standards Act* will continue to apply. Municipalities, as employers, are required to comply with all provincial orders, as

well as any guidance and safety standards prescribed by the province for COVID-19. They are also responsible for ensuring that any staff being reassigned to new duties have the required training and skills. Full details of the orders can be reviewed online at Ontario.ca/alert.

I want to acknowledge and applaud the proactive efforts that many municipalities have already taken to engage in good faith with their bargaining agents to keep their staff employed and safe, and to establish local arrangements to redeploy employees to highneed areas. I would also encourage municipalities to continue leveraging their existing authorities as employers and building on pre-existing relationships and structures with your bargaining agent partners, such as joint health and safety committees, to address staffing needs and allocate resources.

Moreover, as you and others in your organization consider whether and how you will exercise the authority under the emergency order, I would ask that you maintain the following important objectives:

- In making staffing decisions, first provide opportunity for full-time work to existing part-time staff before seeking out and employing extra full-time staff from outside your organization.
- In redeploying staff, should there be a difference in the terms and conditions of work, in the different departments of the organization, the expectation is that staff will not receive a lower wage than their home position.

Municipalities are encouraged to review this and other applicable orders (available on the Government's Emergency Information webpage at: <a href="Ontario.ca/alert">Ontario.ca/alert</a>) and work with their legal counsel for advice and understanding of the flexibility it provides to you in managing your organizations.

If your municipality chooses to implement the authority in these orders, I would ask that you keep my staff apprised by letting your local Municipal Services Office know when you use it. If your municipality has any further questions regarding this order, we encourage contacting <u>your local Municipal Services Office</u>.

I thank you for your continued support and collaboration in these challenging times. This collaborative relationship is critical at all times, and never more so than during this emergency.

# AMO COVID Update – Staff Reassignment Flexibility Provided

The Ontario government has <u>announced</u> support to municipalities through an order O. Reg. <u>157/20</u> under the *Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act* (EMCPA) to provide municipal government with the flexibility for redeployment and other measures where there is local need during the outbreak including child care, social assistance, and by-law enforcement. A similar order (O. Reg. <u>154/20</u>) has been issued for District Social Service Administration Boards (DSSABs).

This order is temporary during the time of the declared provincial emergency and

should be considered as an additional tool to assist municipal employers specifically in responding to the COVID-19 emergency. Municipalities or DSSABs will need to determine where there is a local need for staffing to deliver particular services. All other provincial orders, provincial legislation such as the *Occupational Health and Safety Act* and existing rights under the *Employment Standards Act*, as well as any guidance and safety standards prescribed by the Ontario government for COVID-19 are to be followed.

Employers are responsible for ensuring that any staff reassigned to the new duties have the required training and skills. The orders specify conditions under which the authority can be exercised. This includes requiring a municipality to provide at least 24 hours of advance notice to affected bargaining units before implementing a redeployment plan.

To exercise this authority, if it hasn't already, a municipality will need to declare an emergency under Section 4 of the EMCPA concurrent with this order. The authority provided for in this order includes the ability for municipalities to redeploy certain of their staff within the same employer or to employ volunteers to perform bargaining unit work, cancel leaves and change assignment of work, for those priority services listed in the order.

While it provides new, temporary authority, it is not a substitute for constructive and respectful discussions with bargaining agents and potentially affected staff. As is also noted clearly in the order, this authority is for "reasonably necessary" measures which means use of the authority must be proportionate to the situation at hand.

Ultimately, the way in which this temporary authority is used will influence an employer's future relationship with employees and bargaining agents.

This order O. Reg. 157/20 does not apply to paramedic services. Rather, the Province has provided municipal and DSSAB paramedics services the ability to hire and assign college students who have not yet completed exams or graduated, to provide services where needed that are appropriate to their competence level and scope of practice. It also does not apply to water and wastewater services, public health, or municipal long-term care services which are covered in other orders under the Act. It does not apply to fire services.

#### **Electricity Disconnection Ban Expanded**


On March 19, 2020, the Ontario Energy Board (OEB) extended the ban on electricity disconnections for non-payment for residential customers to July 31, 2020. Now low-volume and small business customers (those who pay time-of-use or tiered electricity prices) will also be protected by the ban during this period. OEB made this change to ensure the risk of loss of electricity service, on account of arrears, would not be an added source of uncertainty at this time.



That this time-of-use billing suspension take effect immediately until such time that the COVID-19 outbreak has been contained; and,



Re: Tourism Oriented Destination Signage Fee Increases

Haliburton County and our local municipalities recently became aware of a significant increase in fees being charged to businesses by Canadian Tourism Oriented Destination Signage Limited. In a time when every effort is being made to remove barriers to prosperity, this change will take money directly from the "bottom line" of small and medium sized businesses and not-for-profits across the Province.

At their most recent meeting, Haliburton County Council passed the following resolution:

Whereas the Ministry of Heritage, Sport, Tourism, and Culture and the Ministry of Transportation supervise the delivery and maintenance of tourism oriented destination signage through a third party – Canadian TODS Limited;

And Whereas our tourism stakeholders and other enterprises rely heavily on this signage to direct customers to their businesses;

And Whereas Canadian TODS Limited recently advised their customers that fees will be doubling, beginning in 2020;

And Whereas this will result in significant financial hardship for those business owners: Now therefore, be it resolved that the Haliburton County Tourism Committee and Haliburton County Council request that the Minister of Tourism, Culture and Sport and the Minister of Transportation reconsider or phase in this fee increase, allowing an appropriate amount of time for businesses to adjust;

And finally that those municipalities that support the resolution be requested to advise the Ministers noted above and their local MPP of their support.

All of the municipalities in the County of Haliburton recognize the value of this signage and the need for cost increases to meet inflation; however, we are asking that this fee increase be reconsidered and phased in to ease the burden on our stakeholders.
