Mayor Bath-Hadden:

On June 16, 2020, our government consulted on Proposed Amendment 1 to **A Place to Grow: Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe** (**A Place to Grow**). As part of the COVID-19 economic recovery efforts, the proposed changes included updates to the population and employment forecasts and related policy changes; a change to the Plan

horizon year; a change to address Major Transit Station Areas within Provincially Significant Employment Zones (PSEZ); and other policy revisions that support our government's objectives to increase housing supply, create more jobs, attract business investments and better align infrastructure. Our government also consulted on a new Land Needs Assessment methodology concurrently. Both consultation periods closed on July 31, 2020.

As a result of our recent consultation, our government has amended **A Place to Grow** and released a new market-based Land Needs Assessment methodology. The Environmental Registry of Ontario decision notices can be found at:

- Amendment 1 to A Place to Grow: Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe: 019-1680
- Land Needs Assessment Methodology for A Place to Grow: Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe: 019-1679

An office consolidation version of Amendment 1 to **A Place to Grow** can be found here and the new market-based approach to Land Needs Assessment Methodology can be found here.

These changes will help municipalities anticipate and plan for growth, as well as support economic recovery from the COVID-19 outbreak. The amendments work together to provide more flexibility to your municipality as you do your long-term planning to address demographic, employment, market demand, and housing affordability trends in the Greater Golden Horseshoe. As well, following feedback received from Indigenous partners, environmental and agricultural stakeholders, we are no longer moving forward on new mineral aggregate operation policies.

These changes will come into effect today, August 28, 2020. The date by which upper and single-tier municipalities must update their official plans to conform with the policies in **A Place to Grow** will remain July 1, 2022. For lower-tier municipalities, the deadline for conformity with this Plan will continue to be one year after the relevant upper-tier conformity amendment takes effect.



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

I was recently advised that a committee was struck to consider supporting a housing project for unsheltered people with addictions and/or mental health concerns to be build at 133 Main Street, Beaverton on lands adjacent to Lakeview Manor and Gillespie Gardens.

I, as a new homeowner within the last 5 years, am totally against this resolution. I do not believe this project should be built in this small community and should be sent to a larger community such as Lindsay or Cannington.

I moved to Beaverton to retire and enjoy the small town atmosphere and get away from the big city and all of its problems, which are exploding as we speak.

Beaverton is just too small and these unsheltered people value their freedom which may come into conflict with this varied community. This build is across from the Beaverton fairgrounds [baseball, soccer, etc], ice arena, and curling arena, which must be considered.

Cannington, as we have been told, and I have contributed to, is getting a large ultra modern clinic/hospital which would be better able to care for or advise these unsheltered people.

If the decision would consider Lindsay, with Ross Memorial and other facilities for unsheltered people, I would support this construction but to put this in Beaverton would be a huge mistake.

The decision to build in Beaverton may hamper future elections, as the people I have spoken to are very upset and have started a petition that is against this construction. I do realize that there are four councilors for this resolution and three against. Please consider another venue as this resolution may bring the community of Beaverton in conflict with your council of Brock.

The Federation of Canadian Municipalities' <u>virtual Board election and annual general</u> <u>meeting</u> are fast approaching. This is an important reminder to **make your voice heard** in this democratic process. Your participation matters.

REGISTER NOW

You must <u>register</u> by September 11 if you want to participate in FCM's virtual elections on September 28-30 and October 5-7 and our AGM on October 15. Anyone who sits on an FCM member municipality council is eligible. Registration is free and takes less than 5 minutes to complete.

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FCM members participate each year in a democratic process to elect representatives to our Board of Directors, which normally happens during our annual conference. Because of COVID, we're holding this year a virtual event instead.

BECOME A CANDIDATE

Director candidates must submit consent forms and a resolution by September 24.

Table Officer candidates have until September 14 to submit their documentation.

These are the key dates in our election process:

- Table Officer election: September 28-30
- Director candidate speech webinar: October 5



Currently there are about 179,325 older adults, aged 55 and over in Durham Region, representing 27.8% of the population.






INTRODUCTION

The recent global pandemic, known as COVID-19 (Coronavirus Infectious Disease) has highlighted the vulnerabilities of this population. While some of those vulnerabilities are associated with age and health, other indicators can include access to services, challenges with mobility, poverty and food insecurity, and social isolation.



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
IMMIGRANT SENIORS

In Durham, 18,180 seniors (65+) live alone, representing almost 15% of all seniors.




1 in 5 seniors who live alone also live in poverty, more than double the poverty rate for all seniors



After careful thought, as a taxpayer and resident, I wish to share my response to your planned housing unit for the homeless in the town of Beaverton. I am thankful to Mike Jubb and other councillors who through their careful stewardship opposed the project and further support an intense investigation into the feasibility of this location. Knowing this town well, I oppose your project anywhere in Beaverton.

Beaverton is completely under serviced to respond to the needs of this incoming proposed population. Regardless of who owns the land adjacent to Gillespie Gardens, it is utterly foolhardy to put such a vulnerable population adjacent to an existing vulnerable seniors residence in a town with a fragile economy. In short, putting this facility anywhere in Beaverton is a big mistake and those who voted to do so also know it is a mistake. In fact, those who made the decision have demonstrated that they are unworthy of holding public office. It is also my belief that there are viable and impactful solutions that must be explored before such a detrimental decision is made.

For consideration, I offer two such alternatives:

- 1. Homelessness is a systemic problem on a national scale and needs to be addressed seriously. I suggest that the funds allocated for this project be used in a federal/provincial/municipal collaborative program on base within the Canadian Armed Forces. All the services required are present. This would provide a home/ shelter, existing mental, physical and dental health services, counselling along with physical exercise, discipline, camaraderie, routine, employment and more. Further, a mentoring program one to one would help realign values, defeat isolation and despair....the Canadian Armed Forces can assist and turn this around and assist these folks to becoming contributing members of society. Homelessness is a huge crisis and requires multi-level government intervention and support.
- 2. A more immediate but weaker alternative option is to relocate this project to an environment that has the support system and infrastructure with minimal disruption to the community. Regardless of the ownership of the land adjacent to Gillespie Gardens, you must be aware, this project will never succeed in Beaverton. There is, however, significant land and services in Goodwood/Uxbridge area; to a lesser extent Sunderland, although far greater than in Beaverton.

As elected officials you are compelled to explore all options and protect the community of taxpayers that already have built lives and homes in Beaverton. Consider a structure that would actually rebuild the lives of the homeless and not disturb the wellbeing of the entire community. The liability of your decision rests with each of you and the members of the Beaverton Community hold you accountable.

Species at Risk Partnerships on Agricultural Lands - Pending Intake Opening September

Through a partnership with the Ontario Social and Crop Improvement Association, the <u>Species at Risk Partnerships on Agricultural Lands</u> (<u>SARPAL</u>) is focused on working with farmers to support the recovery of species at risk on agricultural lands. 



Oshawa City Council considered the above matter at its meeting of June 22, 2020 and adopted the following recommendation:

"Whereas on March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization and the Canadian Government declared COVID-19 a global pandemic; and,

Whereas on March 12, Ontario ordered schools closed and by March 17, began a more extensive shut down; and.

Whereas the pandemic has led to the closure of public spaces and the cancellation of events around the world throughout the country our province and right here within our own community, causing great stress on the arts sector; and,

Whereas local cultural organizations such as the Oshawa Folk Arts Council representing over 13 member clubs and organizations, as well as the many local service groups such as the Oshawa Rotary Club, have all been forced to cancel major events (i.e. Fiesta Week; Rib Fest; etc.) which historically contribute in large part to the fundraising and operational financing efforts of these sociocultural entities; and,

Whereas the Government of Canada and the Province of Ontario have committed they through the Canada Council for the Arts will continue to work with the Government of Canada, as well as provincial, territorial, and municipal partners, to ensure the strength of the sector; and,

Whereas at present, the Canada Council's for the arts priorities as are our collective governing priorities are to ensure the health and safety of people across Canada and around the world and to work towards the sustainability and recoverability of the arts sector; and,

Whereas a significant period has past without further indication as to what tools, funding measures, or financial support our local social cultural, service clubs, and children/youth minor sporting originations can readily access to help support their operating costs and programming,

Therefore be it resolved:

- 1. That the Federal, Provincial, and Regional Government help local municipalities assist their local social cultural, service clubs, and children/youth minor sporting originations with clear and definitive relief funding programs directed to help sustain the afore mention groups through these trying times inflected on them by the affects of COVID-19; and,
- 2. That a copy of this resolution be sent to the Prime Minister of Canada, the Premier of Ontario, all Ontario Municipalities, all Members of Provincial Parliament, all Members of Parliament and Association of Municipalities of Ontario and Federation of Canadian Municipalities."
