In Memoriam

Lorne Brethour



Lorne Brethour was born and raised in Brock Township. As a boy on the farm, Lorne developed a passion for horses and quickly showed a natural ability to work with them.

Lorne married Grace and the couple moved to a farm on the corner of Highway 12 and the 7th concession of Brock. This farm became the home of Wil Lor Stable operated by Lorne in partnership with his brother Wilmot.

Standardbreds became the horse of choice and profit. These were bred, trained and raced at Wil Lor. While some were champions, many more were trained to be winners. Belgians were a favourite breed as well. One old brood mare contributed greatly to putting the name 'Brockstream Belgians' on the map.

Horsemanship came easily to Lorne who was passionate about his craft. While his knowledge was vast, he continuously engaged in new learning through listening and observing. He was a man who let you know where he stood, while always quick with a laugh or a quip.

At a time when the fall fair operation was cash strapped, Lorne and his good friend Jim Gordon along with a few friends started the Horsemen's Dance. This dance allowed the Sunderland Agricultural Society to pay its bills and continue the fair. The fair remains a yearly tradition and much of its success must be attributed to Lorne to whom we owe a great deal of gratitude.



Betty Ann (Fife) Harder



Betty Ann was born on September 23, 1955 in Hastings, Ontario to Harold and Ona Fife. She had an older brother Vaughn (deceased) and a younger brother Paul. They are decendents of David Fife who introduced Red Fife Wheat as the milling industries standard wheat in Canada from 1860-1900.

Betty Ann was an active member of her local Presbyterian church, 4-H and Junior Farmers. Like many of her friends, she met her future husband, Paul Harder, through this organization.

When Betty Ann married Paul in 1977, she not only married him, but the Wick and Sunderland communities. She became active in the Wick Presbyterian Church; 4-H – leading many clubs; and the Sunderland Agricultural Society – serving on the Fair Ambassador Committee, the Tractor Pull Committee and the Culinary Arts Committee over many years. Betty Ann was the Vice-President of the Fair Board when she passed away. Betty Ann was also very influential on the Sunderland Maple Syrup Festival committee.

Betty Ann and Paul Harder operate Harlaine Farms (dairy) Harlaine Maple. Betty Ann was a vital part of both of these enterprises.

Other than Paul, Betty Ann leaves behind her much loved family – son Michael Harder and daughter Dayna (Craig), and her precious grandchildren Katie and Hayden Harder, and Oakleigh and Cash Robson.

Betty Ann passed away on June 30, 2021. She was loved by all and is missed by many dear friends and extended family.

In 1990 and 1991, Bonnie Purvis was President of the Sunderland Agricultural Society. John Moelnaar recalls working with her during this period.



The Sunderland Fair was an important event in the life of Bonnie Purvis. Dedication to making sure that everyone had a wonderful time at the fair was her priority. Her capacity to attend to detail ensured that things flowed smoothly, and her ability to work alongside volunteers made it a joy to work with her. The year that Bonnie was president of the fair, new demolition derby barriers were installed, post holes drilled, and barriers bolted in place. It was extremely difficult work, yet she worked alongside everyone. In the evenings after everyone went home, Bonnie could be seen still working. I had the opportunity to be mentored by her as I would soon follow to be President at the fair. Her resourcefulness and her ability to deal quickly with situations, such as an issue of threatening whether or the late arrival of a midway operator assured that

Sunderland had another successful fair. She often reminded me, that we had a tradition to maintain and needed to take that responsibility seriously. She was quick to give credit to the volunteers, who gave of their time, but you can be assured that she would be working right alongside them.

During 1986, Bonnie further served the Sunderland Agricultural Society in the capacity of Secretary-Treasurer.

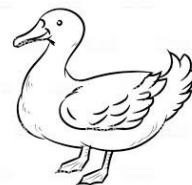

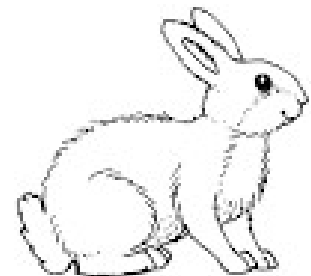

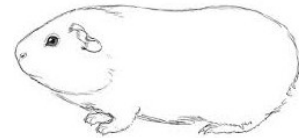

- 30% Uniformity and trueness to type
- 20% Excellent condition and colour
- 50% Other factors: freshness, blemishes, scarring, maturity, tenderness, size, texture, appearance, flavour, smell, properly trimmed. (some Judges will disqualify specimens if not properly trimmed)

Helpful Hints:

- Tomato - leave calyx or pipe attached
- Pumpkins, squash - stem attached and matched
- Pepper - leave one inch of stem
- Onion - do not peel or wash, remove outer skin, tops one inch above bulbs
- Carrot - leave one half inch of top and tap root, wash lightly
- Beets - leave one inch above crown, trim root back to not less than one inch.
- Cucumber, Melon, Watermelon - leave one quarter inch of stem
- Cabbage - leave outer leaves on
- Corn - remove one third of husk from tip to butt
- Potato - do not wash

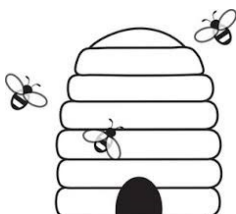

All articles intended for exhibition must be delivered to the presiding Director or Associate Director at the door of the hall, from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. on Monday, September 12th and from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. on Tuesday, September 13th. No person will be admitted to the hall from 11:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., except the officers in charge.
2. Entries, mailed to Box 370 Sunderland, ON, L0C 1H0, must be received three business days prior to the Fair date and contain the membership number of the entrant or the \$7.00 membership fee. Any article forwarded, prepaid and addressed to the Secretary, will receive an Exhibitor's ticket which will be placed on exhibition. This is at the risk and expense, if any, of the owner.
3. All implements and livestock must be on the grounds not later than 11:00 a.m. on the second day of the show. All carriages, teams, single driving horses and drivers must be on the grounds one hour before judging that day.
4. Completed Exhibitor tickets, furnished by the Secretary, must be attached to every animal or article before being handed to the Director to be placed on exhibition.
5. No animal or article shall have on it any prize colour or cards until the awards have been made.
6. Any member may compete for any or all of the prizes offered, and any person may become a member on or before Fair Day in September by paying the sum of \$7.00.
7. Children wishing to enter an Adult class must pay the entrant fee of \$7.00
8. No person shall make more than one entry for each section of a class unless otherwise stated in the Fair Book.
9. Articles entered for competition must be the bona fide property of the person entering them.
10. All articles must have been grown, produced, manufactured, or made since last year's Sunderland Fall Fair.
11. .No cannabis plants, cannabis or cannabis by-products are permitted on the fair grounds.
12. All exhibitors are required to furnish ties and tie up cattle one year old and over.
13. All brood mares must have foal on halter.
14. Should there be only one exhibitor in a class or section, the judges can use their discretion as to awarding a prize. Judges shall not award a prize unless they consider the exhibit actually worthy of such a prize.
15. All exhibitors entering livestock or machinery must show proof of Liability Insurance in the amount of \$2,000,000
16. All persons conversing or interfering with the judges in the discharge of their duties will forfeit any right they have to a prize. The directors will use their utmost endeavour to restrain the judges from examining the animals or articles on exhibition before they proceed to their duties.
17. Admission to the Fair will be by payment at the gate, identifying ribbons, wrist bands or by membership card.
18. The hall opens to the public at 5:30 p.m. on the evening of the first day of the fair.
19. No article entered for competition will be allowed to be taken from the building until the close of the exhibition, which will be between 6:00 and 7:00 p.m. Wednesday, the second day of fair competition.
20. Though the directors will use every possible precaution to secure good order and safety of the articles entrusted for exhibition, they wish to have it understood that the owners themselves must take the risk of exhibiting and should any article be injured or missing, the directors will do their best to recover the article, but will not become responsible thereof.
21. All food booths vendors must be approved by the Society and the Public Health Department before setting up.
22. All gambling will be strictly prohibited. No stands, booths or trafficking of any goods, wares or merchandise will be allowed on the grounds or within 30 meters thereof.
23. All protests or complaints must be lodged with the Secretary in writing within one week after the close of the Fair.
24. Prize winners are requested to communicate with the Treasurer regarding any error they may discover in the list of awards before the payment of prizes. The Treasurer will retain a membership fee for next year from each exhibitor securing premiums amounting to \$10.00 or more.
25. We would appreciate that all cheques be cashed by October 31st in the year the prize was awarded.
26. In the case of bad weather or other unforeseen circumstances and receipts are not sufficient to pay prizes in full, the Directors reserve the right to settle prizes on a percentage basis
27. Discretionary premiums may be awarded for articles not on the prize lists, as recommended by the judges. The directors will determine the amount of the premium.
28. Arena Judges will commence their duties at 12:00 noon sharp, on the first day of the show.
