## Message from Fire Chief Rick Harrison

Your Worship Mayor John Grant and Members of Council, I am very pleased to provide you with the first ever, Brock Township Fire Department Annual Report. As I look back on our accomplishments in 2015, I am extremely proud of the commitment to the citizens of this Township that is demonstrated every day by the women and men of our fire department. Their dedication and commitment is so evident when we are called upon to perform the multitude of emergency and non-emergency services that we deliver to the citizens of our great Township.



The statistical information contained in this report is a summary of the activities of the Township of Brock Fire Department for the year ending December 31, 2015.

In 2015 the women and men of this Fire Department responded to 295 incidents, an increase of approximately 14% from 2014. Fire responses in 2015 totaled 19, approximately 6.4% of the Department's total calls, with an estimated fire loss of \$ 2.3 million.

Motor vehicle accidents/collisions responses totaled 97, approximately 33% of the Department's total calls, with approximately 16% occurring on major highways.

In 2015, we bid a fond farewell to retirees, District Chief Stan Wilson, Firefighter Trevor Baker,

Firefighter Jesse Beaudrow, Firefighter Jeremy Brown, Firefighter Chris Hermann, Firefighter Philip Lloyd, Firefighter Mike Quinn, Firefighter Tim Rosenfield and Firefighter Jordan Thompson. On behalf of the women and men that make up our department, I sincerely thank them for their dedication to our goals and offer my personal "well done" and best wishes for all future endeavors.

The continued support of Council and the CAO/Clerk is appreciated and acknowledged as we continue our quest to provide the very best emergency response and public fire prevention/education programs to the residents we serve.

In closing, I say "Thank You" and ask that the Mayor and Members of Council join our team and together be proactive in delivering all aspects of the Fire Protection and Prevention Act with Pride, Professionalism and Prevention.



## **RESPONSE TYPES**

Suppression personnel respond to a variety of calls, the calls are reported to Council on a quarterly basis, under the following Response Type headings:

FIRES AND EXPLOSIONS: Instance of destructive and uncontrolled burning involving

structures, vehicles and open area fires, including explosion of combustible solids, liquids or gases which may or may not have

resulted in a dollar loss.

PRE FIRE CONDITIONS: Incidents with no fire that involve heat or potential pre fire

conditions e.g. pot on stove, cooking – smoke or steam, lightning,

fireworks.

BURNING (CONTROLLED): Complaint call related to outdoor controlled burning, authorized or

unauthorized.

FALSE FIRE CALLS: Alarm activation or fire call that when investigated, is determined

to be as a result of equipment failure, malicious/prank, perceived

emergency, accidental activation of alarm by person.

**CO (CARBON MONOXIDE)** 

**FALSE ALARM:** A call where it is determined that the detection equipment

malfunctioned or there was a perceived emergency – no CO leak.

PUBLIC HAZARD CALLS: Includes a response for spills and leaks of a hazardous product

such as Natural Gas, Propane, Refrigerant,

Miscellaneous/Unknown, Gasoline or Fuel, Toxic Chemical,

Radio-Active Material, Power Lines Down.

**RESCUE CALLS:** A call for a person in danger due to their proximity to the

occurrence and who is unable to self-evacuate and is assisted by

Fire Department personnel i.e. Vehicle Accident, Building Collapse, Commercial/Industrial Accident, Home/Residential Accident, Person's Trapped in Elevator, Water Rescue or

Water/Ice Rescue.

MEDICAL CALL: Includes a response to assist and/or administered CPR,

Defibrillation.

**OTHER RESPONSES**: Assistance to other Fire Departments, call cancelled on route,

non-fire incidents where an illegal grow operation or drug

operation was discovered.





Totals by Station From Jan 1 15 to Dec 31 15




The following statistical graph illustrates the 4-year trends in responses.

Totals by Year From Jan 1 12 to Dec 31 15




The following statistical graph illustrates the 4-year trend in responses for STATION 8-1.

Totals by Year From Jan 1 12 to Dec 31 15





### Fire Prevention --- Public Safety & Public Education

The goal of the Fire Prevention Division is to provide two lines of defense to our citizens: Fire Safety through Public Education and Fire Prevention through inspections and code enforcement. The Fire Prevention Division is responsible for inspections arising from complaints, requests, retrofits, or self-initiated in accordance with the Fire Protection and Prevention Act and Fire Department policies.

The Fire Prevention Division is also responsible for fire scene investigations, fire cause determination and assisting with the training of firefighters and Municipal staff.

The Fire Prevention Division has been working towards completing primary inspections of all commercial, mercantile and assembly occupancies within the Township. The Division has completed 95% of these types of inspections and we will begin this process again in 2016.

As Chief Fire Prevention Officer for the Township of Brock Fire Department I am very proud of the many accomplishments we have achieved, not only in 2015, but throughout the previous 7-8 years.

## PRIDE PROFESSIONALISM PREVENTION

#### **Public Education**

Public Fire Safety education is an important component of the Fire Department to increase awareness of the need for smoke alarms, carbon monoxide alarms and home escape planning, thus reducing the risk and impact of fires in our municipality.

## Smoke Alarm Program

The purpose of our smoke alarm program is to distribute fire safety and emergency planning literature to the residents of our municipality.

Ontario Fire Marshal requires that each municipal fire department conducts a smoke alarm program, including home fire escape planning and distributes fire safety education materials.


## Get Real Durham Program

Get Real Durham Program was established in 2015 through the Public Educators Committee of the Durham Regional Fire Prevention Officers Association. The program provides basic fire safety information for placement of Smoke Alarms, Carbon Monoxide Alarms and Home Escape Planning.

Through direct mail to 2000 residences within selected communities in each municipality along postings on social media, Facebook, Twitter and Municipal website, consistent messaging was provided throughout the Region during the months of April and September.

#### The Process of Fire Prevention Inspection Duties

The Fire Prevention Division inspects properties as per the following requirements:

- Regularly scheduled inspections of properties
- Regularly scheduled inspection of "At Risk" properties
- Complaint request
- As a follow up to a Fire Department response to a location
- Changes to property occupancy, ownership and/or designation
- Required inspections of "Vulnerable Occupancy" properties
- Request by an owner, operator, tenant and/or an outside entity

The inspection of a property consist of eight (8) steps

- Contact the owner/tenant;
- File search for previous inspections and/or fire code violations;
- Review applicable fire safety plan;
- Inspection of the specific building;
- Note-taking of all findings;
- Research/review of any contraventions;
- Creating inspection orders, when necessary;
- Subsequent re-inspections.

#### At Risk/Vulnerable Occupancy Properties

As per the requirements of The Office of the Fire Marshal and Emergency Management regular inspections are required of properties that involve:

- Large combustible/chemical/hazardous storage capacities;
- Major employer in the municipality;
- Large occupant load

In addition, the Ontario Fire Code requires annual inspections and annual fire drills to be observed by the Fire Prevention Division at all "Vulnerable Occupancy" properties, specifically:


- Care Facilities
- Care and Treatment Facilities
- Retirement Homes

In 2015 five (5) "Vulnerable Occupancies" within Brock Township completed all requirements.

In 2015 the Fire Prevention Division completed 51 inspections and/or re-inspections, 104 Fire Safety Plans were updated and reviewed 6 building plans.



The following statistical graph illustrates the 2015 inspection totals as per the reason for inspection.


